

SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1945 A brief history of the past year's activities

1945 was a year of growth and advancement for the Men's Garden Club of Minneapolis - a year of personal and club achievement.

Our active membership was maintained at the 70 permissible by the by-laws with 4 commercial members and one nonresident member - Dr. Olsen. sincere regret we reported the death of our valued member, C. H. Stewart. During the year, due to moving out of the city or for inability to continue garden activities, resignations were received from Gardner Eustace, one of the founders of this Club, W. J. Geimer, Roy Jacobson, Fred Lorenz, Judge Fred Wright, John Louis and Ernie Maddaus. These vacancies were immediately filled by those on the waiting list and during the year Rene Duford, J. A. Schmitt and William Swain were elected to membership. At the last Board of Director's meeting of Thursday, January third, the following, whose applications had previously been approved by the Membership Committee, were accepted into membership: William Kraft, W. W. Brooks, Edwin Culbert, Harold Stephens, Fred Stephens, Ralph Cornelison and William Robinson. These members will, we know, make valuable additions to our Club, and we hope they will receive considerable benefit from us.

11 Issues of Spray

During the year, ll issues of the Spray were mailed - the August issue being a double due to there being no July issue because of vacations. The Spray again was most ably edited by Jack Cohen and Ed Montgomery and stands high among similar garden club bulletins throughout the country. A file of Sprays will act as a yearbook for the Club, and in it many valuable gardening suggestions and recommendations will serve as reference.

Relations with the Minnesota Horticultural Society and the Men's Garden deal of worthwhile information from them is on file. It is suggested that it might be well as part of our future programs to have a short review of pertinent articles from other clubs' activities as reported in their bulletins, although I would suggest that we confine our exchanges to the bulletins of those clubs with similar climatic and growing conditions to ours, as bulletins from the deep South mean little to us here in Minnesota.

12 Regular Meetings

Twelve extremely worthwhile meetings were held during the year - 7 educational and experience meetings, 2 colorful and successful flower shows, 2 memorable garden tours, and one fine Christmas program to which the wives were invited. Certainly none of us could have attended these meetings, listened to the information and suggestions, and participated in the diccussions without becoming better gardeners.

The average attendance at these meetings was 40 7/12, and the following 6 had 100% attendance: Bill Block, C. G. Cerney, Harold Kaufmann, Herb Kahlert, Upsher Smith and Andy Nyberg, who, I am sorry to say, because of a serious attack of the flu, is missing his first meeting in, I believe, two years. I know that we all wish Andy a speedy and complete recovery. Seven Directors' meetings were called and held and were well attended.

Special Project Reports

During the year we had reports from our Rosarians and Chrysanthemarians. Thirteen participated in the sweet pea project under <u>Upsher Smith</u>, 15 in the tuberous begonia project under

During the year an Interest Questionnaire was completed by 30 of our members representing a fairly good crosssection of the activities and interests of the Club. We found that 24

these 30, an active interest was expressed in the following: fruit trees,
12; lawn trees, 8; shrubs, 12; vines,
9; roses, 24; begonias, 21; 'mums, 23;
dahlias, 13; greenhouse, 15; hot frame,
9; cold frame, 13; compost, 16; photography, 13; movies 6; stills, 9; and
color, 8.

We are indebted to the Park Board for their co-operation and fine facilities; to Henry Bachman. Chris Mosberg and Gould Seed Co. for their usual generosity, and to Mrs. Kahlert. Mrs. Cristman and Mrs. Filbert for their splendid work in making three of our suppers so delicious.

This job as secretary has been a lot of fun and some work, but above all, a memorable experience because it has made me better acquainted with a group of fine men always helpful and willing. I am grateful for the experience because I have made many friends, and because of them I have become not only a better gardener but a more appreciative one.

Above all, however, has been the privilege of working with our president. A secretary, they say, is but an errand boy for the president. That may or may not be true, but I was perfectly happy in my position because I received back so much more than I gave. Like every man here, I am a better gardener because of Herb Kahlert, because of his interest and activity, his enthusiasm and drive, his inspiration and example, his patience and self sacrifice, which have been the potent forces that brought this small gathering of interested gardeners to a club whose present strength and influence are favorably and nationally known.
